We are currently working on an exciting project in which we're curating 18th and 19th Century English and French Antiques to integrate with more modern appointments. It is this mix that excites us, and we believe is the most captivating in design.

NYS: What are your top 5-10 favorite pieces and why?

Caleb Anderson:

1) Hyde Park Antiques. An important George III Giltwood Armchair. England, c. 1775. Giltwood.

I would love to see this beautiful antique giltwood armchair given a new personality with an elegant contemporary upholstery fabric.

2) Donzella. Important Console Table. Gio Ponti & Paolo de Poli. Italy, c. 1948. Italian walnut inset with enameled copper tiles.

This rare and remarkable console is a collaboration between Ponti and Depoli. The use of walnut and enameled copper make a very interesting material combination and memorable statement of design.

3) Maison Gerard. Roi Soleil. Line Vautrin. France, c. 1965. Talosel, multicolored mirrored glass.

A radiant mirror from 1960s France would add sparkle to any room with its showy multi-colored mirrored glass.

NYS: Do you have a booth/s you always gravitate towards? Which and why?

Caleb Anderson: Ronald Phillips always has a fascinating exhibit of fine English antique furniture, and Maison Gerard is always a showstopper with their chic and unusual curation of object and furniture.

Caleb Anderson: I am smitten with the *Gilded Magrittes Butterfly Vessel* by Jennifer McCurdy. This striking contemporary porcelain exhibited by Michele Beiny is so gorgeous. The delicate play of light and shadow within the work and the gilding highlights the beautiful form.
