The Winter Show Returns to the Upper East Side

Back for another year, the Winter Show debuted in the Park Avenue Armory on the Upper East Side last Friday, and remains open through February 2. The show brings together 72 of the top dealers and designers in the trade to support the East Side House Settlement, a community-based organization for New York. This Thursday, the design fair will also host the annual Young Collectors Night, featuring creative direction from Luke Edward Hall.

"Being a young dealer, I am very excited about my first young collectors night at the Winter Show. The show has so much to offer for young collectors," exhibitor Taylor Thistlethwaite tells AD PRO. "Just by walking the floor, you have the opportunity to see the best of the best and actually interact with the pieces."

Michele Varian Shop Opens in Brooklyn

After closing the doors of her longtime SoHo location, designer Michele Varian has opened a store in Brooklyn at 400 Atlantic Avenue. Her eclectic range of home accessories, jewelry, and furniture are all on display in the new shop. The move comes after increased rents made her Howard Street boutique no longer viable to maintain.

"It's disappointing to me that it's no longer sustainable to operate a design retail business in the neighborhood I live in," Varian said in a statement. "But the character of SoHo has changed radically since I opened my shop in 2001."

International Center for Photography Opens in Lower East Side

The new International Center for Photography museum is now open at 79 Essex Street. Designed by Gensler, the Lower East Side museum rejoins the school and gallery in a combined 40,000-square-foot setting, and act as an engaging community space for students, ICP members, and museum goers alike.

Landmarks Commission Approves Terminal Warehouse Revitalization

Last week, the Landmarks Preservation Commission approved L&L Holdings' plans to revitalize the historic Tunnel Warehouse building on 11th Avenue in West Chelsea. In collaboration with architecture firm CookFox, L&L and Normandy Real Estate Partners will be reinventing much of the building while preserving the historic façade. As a result of the massive endeavor, some of the building's tenants are leaving, including the 1stdibs gallery.
